Jean Bologna, MD, is Professor of Dermatology at the Yale University School of Medicine. She has served as President of the Medical Dermatology Society, the Women's Dermatologic Society and the American Dermatological Association, in addition to serving as Vice President of the Society of Investigative Dermatology, the American Board of Dermatology, and the International Society of Dermatology. She has also been elected to serve on the Board of Directors of the American Academy of Dermatology and the International League of Dermatological Societies. Jean is the senior editor of the textbook, *Dermatology*, which is now in its third edition. In addition to recently serving on the FDA's Dermatologic and Ophthalmic Drugs Advisory Committee, she is the founder of the Clinical Scholars Program of the SID and author of over 190 articles and book chapters.
